### Council Update

#### Council Discusses Amendments to Spruill Dog Park Naming Policy

Council adopted a [naming policy for Spruill Dog Park](#) in April 2018 and amended it in November 2018. At its work session on June 11, they discussed some possible additional amendments to the current policy.

Currently donors can purchase bricks, flagstones, and benches at Spruill Dog Park through the Addison Legacy Foundation who reinvests those funds back into the park. Criteria for naming and recognition of Spruill Dog Park elements include:

- Individuals or businesses who donate a minimum of \$100 in funds are eligible for recognition on a brick paver. A total number of 1,000 Brick Pavers are available for recognition.
- Individuals or businesses who donate a minimum of \$1,000 in funds are eligible for recognition on an individual flagstone. A total number of 30 individual pieces of flagstone are available for recognition.
- Individuals or businesses who donate a minimum of \$10,000 in funds are eligible for recognition on a bench. A total number of 12 benches are available for recognition.

Elements in Spruill Dog Park may include the following types of recognition:

- Dog Name
- Individual or Family Name
- Business Name

Council discussed removing the provision in the current policy that allows Spruill Dog Park to be renamed after individuals or a business who donate a minimum of \$250,000 in a single gift to Spruill Dog Park. They also discussed revising the recognition elements to limit messages to those that are dog-centric.

### **Modern American Restaurant Stirr Coming to Village on the Parkway**

At its June 11 meeting, Council approved a special use permit for Stirr, a 10,110 square foot, two-story restaurant at Village on the Parkway that will serve classic American dishes. The restaurant offers lunch, dinner, and brunch, as well as a variety of seasonal social events. Owned by Milkshake Concepts, the original Stirr and another similar concept called Vidorra are both currently located in Deep Ellum.

### **Zero Latency to Open First Texas Location in Addison**

Council also approved a special use permit at its June 11 meeting for a virtual reality entertainment venue at Village on the Parkway. Zero Latency is a startup retail entertainment outlet providing "free roam" virtual reality gaming experience in a large scale setting. Free-roam virtual reality allows up to eight players to move freely in an open space while wearing a virtual reality headset and gear. Motion capture technology is used to track the physical location of players, which allows the in-game virtual location of players' avatars to be generated accurately.

Zero Latency is an Australian-based technology company that opened the world's first virtual entertainment venue in 2015 in Melbourne, Australia, and has grown to 24 stores across multiple continents, with U.S. locations in Phoenix, Boston, Tulsa, and Las Vegas. The Village on the Parkway location will be its first in Texas.

### **Upcoming Public Hearing on Political Signage**

At the Work Session on May 28, 2019, the City Council discussed the Town's current regulations and enforcement procedures related to political signage. At that time, Council directed Staff to explore changing the Town's political signage regulations to accomplish the following:

- Prohibit political signs within the public right-of-way (ROW)
- Formally prohibit political signs on Town-owned property, such as parks and Town facilities
- Establish limitations on political signs near polling places

Based on Council's direction, Staff has drafted changes to the Code of Ordinances Section 62-247. - Political Signs. The proposed changes would remove the existing regulations on signs in the ROW and replace them with new language expressly prohibiting signs in the ROW and on Town-owned property with two exceptions.

1. Signs would be allowed in the front and side yards of single-family residential properties as long as the signs are at least three feet away from the edge of the street or, in locations with sidewalks, three feet away from the edge of the sidewalk.

Staff is proposing this exception because in many of the Town's single-family neighborhoods, the ROW extends well into what residents consider their yard. In Midway Meadows, for example, the ROW extends 11.5 feet behind the back of the street curb. There is another residential property in Town where the ROW extends 50 feet into what appears to be the resident's front yard. To simplify enforcement for property owners and Staff, the proposed language would not distinguish between the ROW and single-family residential front and side yards as long as the sign is at least three feet from the edge of the pavement. This exception would not apply to rear yards adjacent to streets.

2. Signs would be allowed on Town-owned property that has been designated as a polling place. In such locations, two political signs would be allowed per candidate or issue for the period of time beginning with early voting and continuing through the completion of the election. Prior to the voting period, Staff will mark an area where signs are allowed. Signs in these locations would be limited in size to no more than 12 square feet and four feet in height, and the regulations would prohibit illuminated signs or signs with moving elements.

This item is listed on the [City Council's June 24 agenda](#) as a public hearing so that the community can provide input. Based on any input received, Staff will request direction from Council and bring back an ordinance formally adopting new regulations for political signs at the July 9, 2019 Council Meeting.

## Around Town

### Storm Debris Clean Up Continues



Crews are making great progress on the cleanup effort from the June 9 storm, but there is still work to be done. Our Parks Department has dedicated two crews of groundskeepers to removing damaged trees and those efforts have been supplemented with temporary workers and six contract crews who are working on cleanup. We anticipate this will take up to eight weeks to complete.

There are 17 people from the water, streets, and stormwater divisions collecting debris in the neighborhoods. Crews have almost caught up with what has been placed on the curb, but additional debris is still being put out daily. CWD was out last weekend and Public Works employees are planning to work an additional six hours this Saturday to continue debris collection. Staff estimates it could take a month to clear the remaining debris depending on whether residents continue to place tree limbs on the curb or have their contractors dispose of them.

The Town estimates that over 720 cubic yards of debris have already been collected. We really appreciate everyone's patience as we continue to focus on storm clean up efforts throughout town.

### **Volunteer Lynn Nash Recognized for 300+ Volunteer Hours**



On Wednesday, June 19, Addison Advocate volunteer Lynn Nash was recognized for dedicating over 300 hours of volunteer time since 2015. ### Indoor Pool Resurfacing Project Wrapping Up





Less than a month ago, the Town started the indoor pool resurfacing project at the Athletic Club. Over the past three weeks, contractors have removed the old pool plaster and replastered the pool with Diamond Bright plaster, re-grouted the tile lane lines and targets, cleaned and polished the stainless steel gutter, and installed both new LED underwater lights and new depth markers and no diving decals.

### Farmers Branch Creek Dredging Underway



The Town has recently begun the process of dredging Farmers Branch Creek at Vitruvian Park from approximately Bella Lane to the weir structure 600 feet south of Ponte Avenue. Contractors plan to remove approximately 5,000 cubic yards of silt through a channel that is roughly 50-feet wide, five-feet deep, and about 1,900 linear feet.

They are using a hydraulic dredging method where water-filled sediment is sucked up from the pond bottom through a vacuum-like device. The sediment will be put in large drying bags that will be placed in temporary construction easements on the banks of the ponds until the material dries enough to be removed to an approved municipal landfill.

We expect pumping operations to start at the end of next week, weather permitting. Work will begin in the upper main pond area, followed by the grotto, and then finally, the lower main pond area. The project is anticipated to be completed in October.

The park will remain open, but portions of the park will be closed periodically throughout the project. We ask residents to use caution around construction areas and be aware of

their surroundings. Thank you for your patience as we work to make Addison a better place to live, work, and play.
